

I know eyewear of period design can be expensive, but a lot less than a new shell jacket or trousers. Many optometrists now offer decently acceptable frames and some even carry a special line of period style frames. Check the internet for sutlers that offer authentic frames. Also keep your eyes out (no pun intended) at antique stores for real old frames, and if they fit you. You can get lenses made to your prescription to fit most of them. You prescription can be obtained from your optometrists for free. Yes they can be tinted brown or green if your eyes are sensitive: it is authentic. Artillery Manual

Instruction For Field Artillery

Cushing's is a field artillery unit, we are a mounted artillery. Which is generally attached to, and maneuvers with infantry. Mounted artillery has cannoneers marching at the side of their pieces. Sometimes they are mounted on the artillery chests. Another type of field artillery is: horse artillery, which generally attached to , and maneuvers with the cavalry.

The proportion of field artillery to other arms varies 1-4 per 1000 other arms. For infantry it is two pieces of artillery per 1000 men. A 6 gun battery in the field consists of : 5 officers, 150 enlisted men (including non-coms) and 110 horses. Where the men are detailed is not given here, the numbers varies from 20-30 depending on the circumstances. It should never be less than 25 for field service. Total number of rounds per 6 gun battery in the field is 1100-1344 depending on the type of piece.

The friction Primer-It is ignited by the friction produced in drawing a rough wire briskly through a friction composition consisting of one part chlorate of potassa and two parts of sulfuret of antimony, moistened with a weak solution of gum Arabic and mixed together in as wet state.

A cavalry will take about 7 minutes to travel 1000 yards. This charge starts from a walk until the final 200 yards when in a gallop. In that time each piece can fire 11 rounds of shot, and 5 canisters (or about 2 1/4 rounds per minute) This rate accounts for aiming-it understood that canister is not aimed. Canister is effective from 350 yards and in, depending on the terrain. Firm ground the balls can ricochet along the ground. Swampy ground double canister 150-160 yards on in can be used.
