Carnegie, Pennsylvania ~ For some 30 years Civil War veterans met in a room at the Carnegie Library to share memories of victory and defeat and comrades past. Part social hall and part museum, the GAR Post was home to a collection of swords, rifles and other wartime mementos.

But some time before the Capt. Thomas Espy Post's last member died in 1907, the room in the town library outside Pittsburgh was locked and all but forgotten. Beset with funding problems and a deteriorating main library, the Post and it's collection (including records, bullets, cotton tufts plucked from a Virginia battlefield, a canteen and a newpaper printed on wallpaper obtained when Grant took Vicksburg) would have to wait.

But now this Post – one of perhaps a half-dozen that remain largely intact – will reopen as part of the Library's celebration of the 201<sup>st</sup> ann. of President Lincoln's birth.

The renovations come courtesy of Bill Brown, who learned of the room's existence and donated the funds  $\sim$  "It was just a way to give back to the community. I could just imagine the old Union soldiers sitting in there reliving their tales of battle and victory and defeat. I just thought it was neat."

Brown, 64, is president and CEO of a company that makes equipment for steel mills. While he isn't a Civil War buff, Brown had ancestors that fought on both sides of the conflict.

Restoration includes a dedicated ventilation system, reflective window coatings, and repainting the room to its original color, which exc. Director of the Andrew Carnagie Free Library, Magaret Forbes, describes as "pumpkin chiffon pie" orange.

The roughly 24-by-24 foot room on the second floor of the Library is a time capsule, with most of the original fixtures and many original documents. The members catalogued many of the relics  $\sim$  of these, 80% are still on hand, including a Bible resting on an oak stand with legs and braces carved in the shape of rifle stocks and bayonets.

Captain Thomas Espy, namesake of the Post, was 50 years old when he enlisted July 4, 1861. He was mortally wounded at Gaines Mill, Virginia, a year later; taken prisoner, he died shortly after in hospital.

It is hoped that descendants of the roughly 250 members of the Espy Post can shed further light on the history of the artifacts, and the stories these brave men had to tell.

Old Abe Camp 8 has pledged to help the Oshkosh Public Museum defray the costs involved with the Museum's purchase of the collection of some 140 letters written by Colonel John Hancock of the 14<sup>th</sup> Wisconsin to his wife, Jennie Reardon Hancock, from May of 1861 to Jan. 1863 – Col. Hancock wrote Jennie once a week and sometimes more, letters she carefully saved, tied in bundles with scraps of fabric and kept in a tin document box.

This very important collection cost the Museum dearly ~ Old Abe Camp 8 has done what we can to help financially.
