As with last year the November meeting will be held one week earlier than our typical meeting. **November 12th** is the day. This is to better accommodate the deer hunting season.

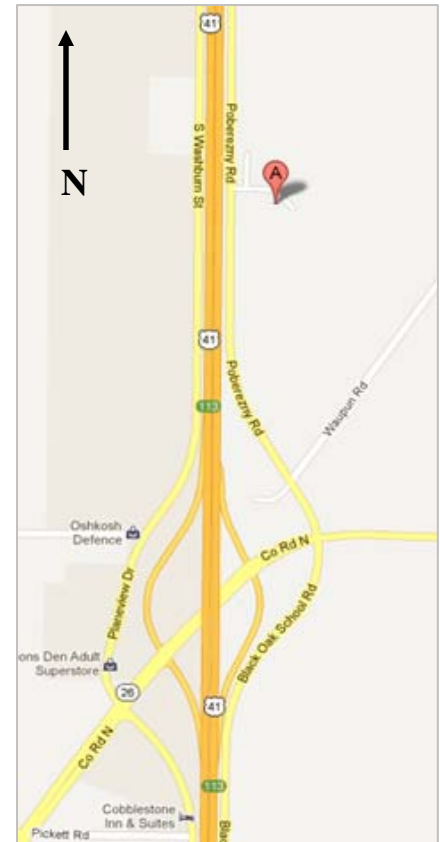

Camp 8 Participation in 2012 Veterans Day Observances in Oshkosh

Veterans Day Memorial Services will be held Nov. 11 at the South entrance of the Winnebago County Courthouse. The service will begin at approx. 10:40 a.m. with a short procession of the Colors by local Veterans and Patriotic organizations (including Camp 8).

Camp 8 member Colonel Vince Barker, U. S. Army Reserve, will be the guest speaker. Memorial wreaths will be placed at the entrance of the courthouse and the ceremony will conclude with a rifle salute and the playing of “Taps”.

Camp 8 will need 2 Color Bearers – who should plan to arrive no later than 10:30 to form up on the North side of the Courthouse.

This annual event is organized by the Oshkosh Patriotic Council, which is composed of representatives from Oshkosh area veterans’ and patriotic organizations, including Camp 8.

Here is a brief description of the **elected** positions (all other officer positions are appointed by the Camp Commander). These descriptions are abbreviated and some detail traditional responsibilities within Camp 8.

Senior Vice Commander –He represents the Commander in his absence, and is often responsible for public relations for the Camp and often the Camp newsletter.

Greetings Brothers,

As the end of the second year of the Civil War Sesquicentennial comes near, Camp 8 continues to play an active part in honoring the Boys in Blue and the sacrifices they made 150 years ago. This past Friday, October 26th, several of us from Camp 8 participated in the 125th Anniversary ceremonies at the Wisconsin State Veterans Home at King, known originally as the Grand Army Home, as it was built based purely on the efforts of the GAR and WRC. PCC Kim Heltemes was the main organizer for the event at the request of the King Home staff. The ceremonies included a ceremonial passing of the flag from the GAR, to the WRC, to the five branches of the military, to the Wisconsin Dept. of Veterans Affairs, back to the King Home Guard. It was a very special and moving ceremony. Details and photos from the event are in this newsletter.

The next day, Saturday, October 27th, Brothers Paul Johnson, Kirby Scott, Alan Petit, Kim Heltemes, and myself travelled to Milwaukee to conduct a joint MOLLUS/SUVCW memorial service for 1st Lieutenant Florian Ries, 17th Wis Vol. Infantry. Ries was a charter member of GAR Post #1 in Milwaukee and an original Companion of the Wisconsin Commandery, Military Order of the Loyal Legion (MOLLUS). Several members from Col. Pier Camp # 1 in Milwaukee participated in the ceremony, including their rifle squad, CC Brian McManus, and DC Tom Brown. Three generations of Meyer family, who are Ries's descendants, attended the ceremony. Several of them are MOLLUS members. Photos and story are in this newsletter.

Flag Restoration Update – Restored Flag of the 3rd Wisconsin Infantry, Company B Returns to Oshkosh

(10/19/2012) Our curator, Sharon Clothier, went to Minneapolis this week and returned with the 1861 Scott's Volunteers Civil War flag. As you will recall, the flag had been in treatment almost two years due to the very tough shape it was in. As I stood watching as Sharon and Deb unwrapped the flag this morning, I was very moved by the symbolism of this artifact, thought of who saw and touched it, and what it means. Scott's Volunteers went into the Battle of Antietam with 345 men and when the great struggle ended on after the second day, only 49 survived.

This historic artifact, which represents so much community history and ties so strongly to the story of America, would have been lost to future generations within a decade without this treatment. So even though it was expensive (\$23,600), it was money very well spent and I again thank the Sons of Union Veterans for donating money to help with this major project. Now, the flag is stable and able to withstand another hundred-plus years. It will be exhibited in *Outstanding Objects*, beginning November 3.

Stitching Together History

Civil War Flag Receives Much Needed Conservation

Story by the Oshkosh Public Museum

September 17 marks the 150th anniversary of one of the bloodiest battles ever fought during the American Civil War: the Battle of Antietam.

Company B of the 3rd Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry, better known as Scott's Volunteers, was one of the Oshkosh-raised companies that saw action at the famed battle. The battle decimated the regiment's ranks, with only 49 men surviving out of 345. But one very big piece of history associated with Scott's Volunteers did make it home.

This remarkable American flag (pictured here pre-conservation) was hand-sewn by a group of patriotic Oshkosh women during the American Civil War. In April of 1861, the flag was presented to Scott's Volunteers before the men embarked to be formally mustered into Federal service.

"Gentlemen, it is with mingled feelings of sadness and joy that we meet you today; sadness that our beloved country should be so rent by treason as to make our parting with friends necessary; joy that, at the first call, so many bravely volunteer to defend what is dear to all, our Constitution and Union. Our hopes and prayers go with you..."

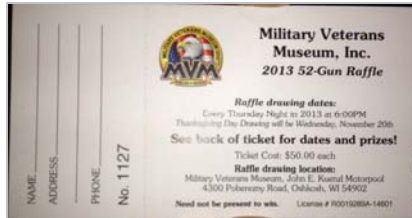
When the flag later returned to Oshkosh, it was carefully preserved by Colonel Scott's widow and daughter and displayed from the family porch each Memorial Day before being donated to the Oshkosh Public Museum on October 5, 1925.

Recently, the flag underwent much-needed conservation treatment, generously supported in part by the Sons of Union Veterans Old Abe Camp #8, and will be on display this November as part of the Museum's fall exhibit, *Outstanding Objects: The Oshcar Awards.*

The membership discussed options for having up to 3 of the Camps' 2013 meeting

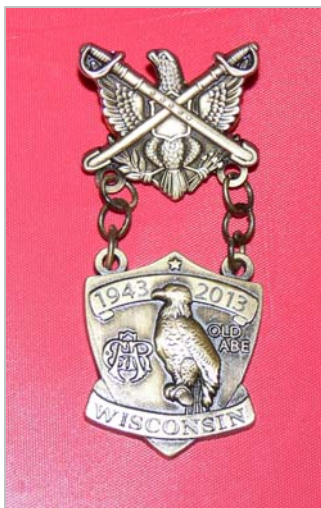

Randy Novak will arrange for a visit to the museum facility to consider having meetings there, with the other options remaining available as backup. The remaining meetings would be distributed between King, Auroraville, and Buttes Des Morts. This variation in meeting location is in support of Commander Vince Barker's objective to move the meeting location around to different areas within the Camp 8 membership region.

Future events were discussed. A sign up sheet for the Wade House Re-enactment was provided. The Florian Ries memorial service was briefly discussed, as was upcoming Veterans Day and Pearl Harbor Day services.

Kim spoke about a Anniversary ceremony for the Wis Vets Home in King on Oct 26th, he is the coordinator for that event. The start time is to be about 9:30AM, and this is on a Friday – which will cause some problems for the non-retired members. Kim announced there would be a “Civil War Ball” for the King residents, but he did not believe it was intended to be open to the public.

Kim also announced that the Weyauwega community intends to have some type of Civil War theme event in 2013. Waupca might also do something, possibly with some focus on the Native American participation in the war.

OSHKOSH and the OLD ABE Camp

In 1885 the Old Abe Camp, located in Oshkosh, was the largest SUV camp in Wisconsin. Old Abe was the famous mascot of the 8th Wisconsin Infantry, popularly known as the Eagle Brigade, a unit heavily involved in the campaigns of the western armies. Old Abe the battle eagle became a real war hero - used for recruiting during the war's later years, attending veterans reunions for years after, and finally becoming a National icon for Wisconsin.
