REMEMBERING COL. PIER: APPLYING GOLDEN RULE TO TROOPS

These monthly articles about our Camp namesake are written by PCinC Steve Michaels. This item first was published in the October 2001 Camp Orders.

In fall 1861, many men of the 1st Wisconsin Infantry were back in federal service, having re-enlisted for three years. Colwert Pier was not among them – he had decided to return to school.

But this 20-year-old, bold veteran of three months did not hesitate to counsel his comrades in the field: "Six elements combined will make a perfect soldier, by which I mean one who is ready at all times for any emergency, and respected by all who know him. Promptness, decision, cheerfulness, sociability, cleanliness and quietness."

He proceeded to identify these qualities with the new officers of the 1st Wisconsin. Two years later, Pier was heeding his own advice while he organized a company and nine others into the 38th Wisconsin. He was elected captain of the company and later was commissioned lieutenant colonel of the regiment.

He said, "Any captain who will think of and respect his men, will be thought of and respected in return ... Let each one, treat every other one as a man should, and he will receive *manly* treatment himself. 'Like will produce like,' whether it be love or acorns. The proverb 'Like master like servant' finds no exception in the army, especially if composed of volunteers."

Pier's simple adherence to the Golden Rule was evident throughout his life. His "religion" or "belief" to act right began with his schooling in Universalism and matured with his practical experience in the school of the soldier.

DRUMMERS AND THEIR MUSIC, FIELD MANEUVERS



At the October Camp meeting, Brother Jeff Lesar showed an article featuring this beautiful 1864 military-issue rope-tension snare drum, used by Pvt. Samuel Kyle of Company K, 22nd New Jersey Infantry.

The manufacturer was Ernest Vogt of Philadelphia. The eagle embellishment on the drum was a common design but varied from manufacturer to manufacturer. The wooden body was painted with shield-breasted eagle holding a ribbon with the inscription, "E pluribus unum."

Many of the field drummers were young boys, age 12 to 16. A drummer sounded the morning and evening camp duties and also the field maneuvers. Most field drummers were accompanied by fifers.



George Bruce served as principal instructor at the young musicians' training center on Governor's Island in New York. Bruce and Daniel Decatur Emmett, the composer of "Dixie," authored "The Drummers' and Fifers' Guide." That guide became the standard for military musicians. The cover page here is from Amazon.

COMING UP


Here is a reminder of activities in the next few weeks.

BROTHER BOB NIX'S ANCESTOR: PVT. ALEXANDER LINDER

Enlisted in 82nd Illinois Infantry, Co. C, on Aug. 16, 1862. Mustered out June 9, 1865.

Was from Chicago.

Captured at Chancellorsville, Va., on May 9, 1863, and paroled on May 15.

The 82nd was mustered in at Springfield. Besides Chancellorsville, its long list of battles includes Gettysburg, Mission Ridge and the Atlanta and Carolinas campaigns. It was one of the scores of regiments at the surrender of Gen. Johnston to Gen. Sherman at Bennett Place in North Carolina on April 26, 1865. Born 1840.

Died Jan. 29, 1888.

Member of Nicholas Miller GAR Post #453 in Hampshire, Ill.

Buried at at Hampshire Center Cemetery at Hampshire in Kane County, III.
