Funeral Services To Be Held Friday 2 p, m.

Taps sounded for Worthy A. Prentice at eleven o'clock, Tuesday night, March 21, when he joined that "innumberable throng".

Undertaker Wetterlin informs the Ledger that funeral services will be held at Clayton Friday afternoon at two o'clock. The body will lie in state at the Community hall from 10 o'clock to 2 o'clock. Burial will be made at Clear Lake.

Mr. Prentice's death removes the last GAR man in Polk county.

He was born at Wilkesbarre, Pa., April 4, 1848, came to Osceola, Polk county in May, 1854, 85 years ago.

Mr. Prentice had been in failing health for over a year and was confined to his bed since early last fall.

In terms of time he left behind him 91 years, 10 months and 17 days.
